Denys provided the question to which the answer was: The Rotary Foundation has raised three billion dollars since its inception





TODAY'S GUEST SPEAKER

Today's speaker, our own Maurice Manttan spoke about his tour of Iran two years ago.

The group landed in Tehran and toured the south east region accompanied by their guide, Professor Harry McQuilliam who was employed for many years in Iran as a Geologist in the oil fields and as a professor at the University of Shiraz..

Maurice's address included comments on; **Politics** (the government has a political system which is paralleled by a religious system); **religion**(other religions are tolerated); economics of oil (Iran is No 3 in the world for oil reserves and No 2 for natural gas); **the Silk Road** (The Silk Road passed through Iran. So did Alexander the Great); **The role of women** (women in the touring party were required to wear local clothes so to be covered); **Iranians are not Arabs**. **Silk carpets** (still a home industry); **Lack of grapes in Shiraz** (there is no sign of Shiraz grapes in Shiraz. Not surprising as only Australia calls Syrah grapes Shiraz) **Afghan Refugees** (there are one million Afghan refugees are in Iran); **infrastructure**, (the oil revenue enables the country to maintain good infrastructure. Water reticulation and natural gas reticulation are widespread) **cultivation** (Apart from the mountain areas the landscape is arid but is cultivated).

He emphasised that his comments were based only on a tourist's impression and we were welcome to challenge them.
