Stewart Darling Lead Through Life (Life Coach)

Kerry Ansell introduced Stewart Darling who spent 23 years in the British Army and retired as a lieutenant colonel. He and his family moved to NZ and he now trains managers in leading and coaching.

Stewart told us that he spent much of his army career in covert operations all over the world. He talked to us about his life and values.
